

The regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Trinidad, Colorado, was held on Wednesday, November 7, 2012 at 7:00 p.m. in City Council Chambers at City Hall.

The pledge of allegiance was recited.

Mayor Baca Gonzalez read aloud the following press release: "The Trinidad City Council met today, November 7, 2012, in executive session. Prior to Council's meeting, Mr. Louis Fineberg withdrew his name from consideration as a City Manager applicant. Of the three remaining finalists Council began preliminary discussions with finalist Ed Gil de Rubio. During the course of those discussions it became apparent that Mr. Gil de Rubio did not want to accept the proffered parameters of employment (with the City of Trinidad, Colorado). At which time Council unanimously accepted Mr. Gil de Rubio's communications as a refusal of the possibility of employment. It was determined by Council that Messrs. Van Wormer and Strahl were not a good match for the City of Trinidad. Council will (immediately) re-open the search for a new City Manager and shall begin the steps necessary to fill the position of interim City Manager upon the expiration of Mr. Gagliardi's contract. The permanent City Manager will be sought after the position is reposted. The City anticipates using the services of Mr. Ron Miller in guiding the search for the permanent City Manager." She advised those present that a copy of the press release would be provided to those who request it.

READING OF THE MINUTES. Regular Meeting of October 16, 2012 and Special Meetings of October 23, 2012, October 30, 2012, and November 2, 2012. A motion to accept the minutes as presented was made by Councilmember Shew and seconded by Councilmember Miles. The motion carried by a unanimous roll call vote, excepting Councilmembers Bonato and Velasquez who abstained from consideration of the October 16th minutes due to their respective absences from that meeting.

PETITIONS OR COMMUNICATIONS, ORAL OR WRITTEN. Joe Reorda addressed Council. He said he was before them to speak on the topics of love, compassion and courage. Mr. Reorda told Council that he loves this community very much and has lived here for 77 of 78 years, and has been in education for the last 41 years. He said he has never in all those years seen such hatred and discontent and people being so upset. He said he thinks all of us together need to finally decide that we need to get together and work as a unit. We need to bury all of the past, please. He said the articles in the Chronicle News continue to repeat events of the past such as recall petitions, Mr. Rino's resignation, etc. It is old news and we need to go forward and start fresh and do whatever we need to do to suave the wounds of all of the things we've created. He added that he thinks we all can take a little credit for all of those things. Compassion – for those City employees that have suffered through this entire time and misery – he started with Acting City Manager Gagliardi by thanking him and Interim City Attorney Downs for coming into a hornet's nest and surviving. He opined that Acting City Manager Gagliardi has done a wonderful job considering his background as a banker. His reputation in this community is impeccable and he said he thinks he has worked as hard as anybody could, considering the circumstances. He expressed compassion also for Councilmember Velasquez who over the last several months has endured verbal abuse from the audience during several Council meetings because of an incident in one of her many, many attempts to make a living. He likewise expressed compassion for Ms. Mantelli (Pat) who has had trouble with her liquor establishment. These people have gone without sleep and eating because they are in fear of losing their business. He especially expressed compassion for the people who have businesses in our community, adding that we have to do something. Those people are struggling, noting that he is sure the problem is shared nationwide. Mr. Reorda suggested since the Chamber and Economic Development are almost doing the same job, in this time of crisis and budget constraints we should serious think about combining those two and hire an efficient director and assistant to do both jobs. He said he's sure the City and County could work together to get that done. There are surely a lot of businesses out there that could be enticed to come here, not industry, and we should try to get the mine back on its feet. Also, we need to remember that there is no I in team. He concluded that it takes courage to sit up there (on Council), it takes guts and compassion and love.

Ted Martinez addressed Council as a concerned citizen. He commended Council for accepting Ed Gil de Rubio's decision not to apply. He wished Council well in finding a new City Manager and doing a proper and thorough search. He concluded that he'd like to see Acting City Manager Gagliardi reconsider and make this a full-time job, adding that he's done magnificent.

Tom Murphy addressed Council. He reminded Council that he has been filming board meetings for a long time and has observed a lot of board behavior. He said this is really distressing to him, adding that he now compares Council to the School District. They had an excellent administrator in Dr. Julie Ford, but because she didn't pet enough egos and the Board wanted to micro-manage, they made sure they got rid of her. He said that's kind of what happened here and that he really expected more of the Council members - that they were going to rise above all of this – that's why they had supported them, so they would come here and do the right thing. This community, the union, the people in the business community got behind Ed Gil de Rubio and what Council has done is wrong. He said when Mr. Gil de Rubio met with he and Paula because they had the television and newspaper and he sat in their office, they asked him about transparency. Mr. Gil de Rubio said he believed in transparency. Mr. Murphy said they had a writer, Randy Woock, who went and asked former City Attorney Jerod Beatty for a draft budget and was told he couldn't have it. Mr. Gil de Rubio stamped it draft and said 'give it to them.' The relationship began that for the first time we had someone in government, reminding that he's observed more than anyone else present, who believed in transparency and was a leader. Trinidad does not want leaders. He said he told one of the Council members that he knew the negotiations were going to fail because Council was going to kill it off in

negotiations and that's exactly what happened. Mr. Murphy said he talked to Mr. Gil de Rubio after Interim City Attorney Downs offered the first round and he was angry, which he said he didn't blame him for. He explained that it was because the first issue was quarterly evaluations in executive session – that's exactly what started this off, the deal with Linda's (Councilmember Velasquez's) bar and going into executive session – you wanted the man to give up his rights. The second issue was a one-year probation and the third was no severance. That was the deal that was promoted to him. Mr. Murphy said he suspects there might have been some miscommunication and Council may want to reconsider it, because Council was put here by the voters and many of them only have 12 months left. The voters spoke to them and they didn't listen and we are going to go back to the old guard. One of the men sitting here he suspected had his time up again, referring to Joe Reorda, adding that he might be running again because people are going to say 'we expected you guys to do the big thing, the good thing' but will ask themselves why they should do this and instead just go back to the old guard because there won't be turmoil. They are going to put them back in place. Mr. Murphy added that he was distressed because he has listened that everybody's concerned about Audra's (City Clerk Garrett's) job. He thinks about the other 130 people who have jobs here. Really? This town revolves around her and Joe Bonato's ego? That's what this is about. Mr. Murphy said that is his opinion. He concluded that the voters spoke and that it is unfortunate that they didn't listen. There's only another 12 months and we'll do this again. They will find some people who will get behind this community and not poke a man who has a Type A personality. He stated that Council made sure in the negotiations that he was going to get upset. Type A people make good leaders. But Council made sure to get him upset again. Mr. Gil de Rubio wanted to come back here in the worst way and turn this town around and the business people wanted him. He reiterated that he's seen this before and it's unfortunate - with the School District - and Council is headed right down the same road.

Terry Sears first asked Council to use their microphone for hearing impaired people. He said there was an article in the Pueblo newspaper about small business loans being available to businesses for business front restorations or repairs at very low interest rates and favorable terms. He offered to bring it for Council. He noted that he signed up to speak before the Mayor made the press release. Mr. Sears said he received a phone call today and this matter pertains to City staff. He said he got a call from a small business person today who remembered him sharing at these meetings that the reason he got involved in recalls and activities was because he had gone in unannounced with no discussion about his background to the then City Manager with a list of six safety items that he saw around the City and within six weeks all of those items were taken care of. He had an open door policy and followed through. The person called him because she had remembered that story and had been getting the run around trying to get a simple thing done for her business. The caller said she called City Hall and the extensions just ring and don't even go to messages. She talked to two City staff members. The business has only been in town for about three months. It was vandalized about two months ago with an ugly incident at their doorway. The owner of the business last night happened to come down to her business place and the daylight savings time hadn't caught up with the lighting yet. She noticed that the light bulb directly outside of her business entrance was the only one on the street not working. She called City Hall trying to get it fixed. Two of the staff members she talked to basically shined her on, said they were not the person to talk to. Mr. Sears said to him that is inexcusable. Any person who works in City Hall and has a routine call about a street light can simply get them the name and phone number of the Public Works Director. He said incidentally the person who took care of the list of six safety issues he shared with this business person was the person the City decided to fire inappropriately who was doing a great job for the City of Trinidad. Unless they are hiring him he's not here and won't be able to get your light bulb changed, but gave her the information on who to call. Mr. Sears said the Public Works Director responded perfectly once she finally got through to him. He suggested the Acting City Manager to instruct all staff that if a business owner or resident calls and asks for that kind of help, the staff do not hang up until they've given that person the proper information.

Joe Reorda asked if he was correct that when Council goes into executive session it's only the City Council? And when executive session is finished there not something read that states nothing is to be discussed outside of the meeting? Mayor Baca Gonzalez confirmed his assessment. Mr. Reorda asked how they supposed Mr. Murphy got all of that information before the press release was read. He questioned if there was someone giving him information from City Council. Tom Murphy interjected that he got the information from Mr. Gil de Rubio this afternoon. Mr. Reorda urged Mr. Murphy to run for Council. Mayor Baca Gonzalez acknowledged Mr. Reorda's concern to be valid and said they will do due diligence, as Mr. Murphy said he apparently had the information shared with him from Mr. Gil de Rubio.

REPORT BY CITY MANAGER. Financial reports. Acting City Manager Gagliardi disseminated financial reports completed by Ms. Rose Blatnik this afternoon.

Status report on several buildings on Main Street. Acting City Manager Gagliardi said he was asked to give a status report on several buildings on Main Street. He said regarding the Franch building, a local bank has foreclosed on the building and it is presently for sale. He said he toured the building on Monday of this week and found the upstairs portion to be in pretty decent repair. The façade needs to be worked over. There are presently two interested parties looking at buying the building. This information came to him from the officers of the local financial institution that owns the building. Mayor Baca Gonzalez pointed out that the Franch building is the one across from the Miners' Memorial. Acting City Manager Gagliardi advised that he didn't want to address the Cougar Canyon issue this evening and would rather do so at a work session. He deferred to Planning Director Fineberg to provide a status report on the Opera House building and to give an update on the riverwalk grant he is seeking. Planning Director Fineberg addressed Council. He said regarding the Opera House, his source of information is Bill Barnes from the White Group. He told Council that the insurance company has agreed to pay up to \$2 million to bring the building into code compliance. The money can only be spent on things to bring it into code compliance. They plan is to bring the core and shell into compliance and sprinkle the building, according to Mr. Barnes. The way the insurance would like to handle it is to have the owner pay for the repairs and be reimbursed by the insurance company when the repairs are complete. He said his understanding is that the owner is not currently financially able to do this so is seeking other investors to help him with this process. His understanding is that some investors have been found although the number is not solid yet. There is also a provision in the insurance that the building be returned to its former use as a hotel/boutique type of structure. Mayor Baca Gonzalez asked if Mr. Barnes gave him any estimated time line regarding when he might have enough investors to proceed. Planning Director Fineberg answered that we are coming up on the one year anniversary of when the wind actually damaged the building, on November 11, 2011. A progress report needed to be submitted by the 11th, however his understanding is that a six-month extension had been given. He said he believes they will have until that time to come up with a formal proposal. Mayor Baca Gonzalez asked Planning Director Fineberg to check with Mr. Barnes periodically, such as every six weeks, to ensure he knows the City is monitoring how this

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progresses. Planning Director Fineberg said he talks to Mr. Barnes about every other week. He added that the situation with the Opera House looks very positive; better than it did several months ago. Ted Martinez asked if the upgrades to the building will include the electrical and plumbing services. Planning Director Fineberg answered that it would as long as it has to do with code compliance.

Riverwalk grant. Planning Director Fineberg provided a handout regarding grants to Council. He said he just received word today that the City's Boulevard Addition Project has been chosen for funding by GOCO. He reminded that the City is seeking to acquire about 28 acres to create a nature park in the Boulevard Addition. The grant request was for approximately \$180,000 and the City's match is about \$78,000 to \$80,000. The idea would be to create a nature park. He referred to the handout and said it is the final list of projects that are being recommended for funding and it will go in front of the GOCO Board for final vote shortly.

Riverside building. Planning Director Fineberg advised Council that the Riverside Building located next to the Commercial Street Bridge was just purchased and the owner is looking forward to renovating that building. Mayor Baca Gonzalez commented that she wants to be sure the City expends every effort in facilitating the reinvigorating of the downtown effort. If there are ways the City Council can get involved to help that effort, she asked Planning Director Fineberg to not hesitate to bring it to their attention.

Paving Projects. Acting City Manager Gagliardi deferred to Public Works Director Jeff Hill to provide Council with an update on the City's paving projects. PWD Hill addressed Council. He pointed to a map at Council's seating places indicative on the paving that has been done in the past with a legend of streets paved annually since 2004. PWD Hill said he knows there is more paving to be done and there's money allocated for it this year but would like to put together a pavement management plan, a five-year capital investment plan, and evaluate all of the streets that need work and those that have had paving done within the last 10 to 15 years to start putting together such a plan. He said he would propose not spending the entire sum on overlay projects, but rather do some crack seal to keep the good street good and maybe bring some fair streets back into the good category. PWD Hill said he thinks former PWD Valentine had started this process so some of that information may be available and he can take what he has done and run with it. He said he hoped in the next couple of months he would be able to present some form of a pavement management plan and five-year capital investment plan. Mayor Baca Gonzalez noted that the map indicates Colorado Avenue is supposed to be paved and questioned if work had been done on it yet. PWD Hill advised that it was done this year. Mayor Baca Gonzalez also noted that there are a couple of streets on the south side of Trinidad close to Alamo and Portland where there's some problems with water runoff. She said she'd provide the details to see if there is anything that can be done to mitigate that runoff problem. PWD Hill said since he started with the City he has received a couple of calls from citizens expressing interest in some erosion that is occurring along the pavement edge. He encouraged the public to call in so a work order can be generated. One of the City's best resources is citizens notifying us. Mayor Baca Gonzalez said it may be in order to look into some staff training regarding quality service so an individual has the training and understanding to take messages and get it to the correct person. PWD Hill said in his office it will be his goal that if they don't know the answer they take the person's name and address and phone number and either have it addressed or let the caller know how it will be resolved. Councilmember Bonato said he is aware of a problem on Tillotson Street with runoff that has existed for many years, from Tillotson to San Juan Street. He asked that that area be looked at also to help those people. PWD Hill asked him to get in touch with his administrative assistant to generate a work order because they have a system in place that can be monitored for completion.

REPORT BY CITY ATTORNEY. Interim City Attorney Downs advised Council that he will address the Mantelli liquor license matter under that agenda item.

COMMITTEE REPORTS. Mayor Baca Gonzalez announced that she has made a request that Council start on a quarterly basis receiving reports from the various boards and committees. At a future date Council will start receiving those regular reports from the committees.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS. Public hearing for consideration of an ordinance regarding the provision of natural gas service by the Trinidad Municipal Natural Gas Department, and decreasing the gas supply charge applicable to all customer service classifications. Mayor Baca Gonzalez declared the public hearing open and recognized Utilities Superintendent Jim Fernandez to provide information regarding this provisional ordinance. Supt. Fernandez advised that the City was fortunate that NPGA from Nebraska, the City's gas supplier, reduce the price of gas to the City enabling the City to pass that savings on to its customers through a decrease in the gas supply charge, in accordance with the City's ordinance. He added that he spoke with the City's gas consultant, Mike McFadden, who suggested the City take another look at this ordinance again after the first of the year to see how prices have stabilized. No negative comments were received during the posted hearing period. He recommended the ordinance be passed. Terry Sears addressed Council. He expressed concerns that stating it as a provisional ordinance could be incorrectly reflected in the minutes. Mayor Baca Gonzalez explained that the intent is that this ordinance is not the final ordinance. They will take another look at it at the first of the year. She ensured Mr. Sears that the minutes would accurately reflect the intent. Mr. Sears continued that he read in today's paper about the gas pipeline that broke near Walsenburg and affected Walsenburg and Aguilar. The story said the line runs all the way to Trinidad. It said getting it fixed and how long it would take depends on how far out it is. He asked if that is the case and how often the line is examined, because if that is the only line into Trinidad we are pretty vulnerable. Acting City Manager Gagliardi reminded that one can't believe everything they read in the paper. He suggested that if he wanted the information he could have called the gas department or him. Mr. Sears countered that is the exact language that people around the City that come to him for help find offensive. It's passive aggressive language. He added that he didn't ask for a debate with him, just a simple answer and that he finds that behavior inappropriate. Mayor Baca Gonzalez interjected that if someone has a question they are certainly welcome to ask it before City Council. If need be, it will be referred to the appropriate individual and citizens have the right on their own to call the Acting City Manager or Supt. Fernandez or other City staff members. Steve Block addressed Council. Mr. Block advised the he spoke to Gas Forman Steve Curro about the gas line break and was informed that Trinidad's gas comes from the east, not the north, and so it is not an issue here. Councilmember Shew added that the gas lines are not owned by the City it is owned by Colorado Interstate Gas. They take care of those lines and do inspect them, and Trinidad's gas comes in from the east. Cheryl Clark, Black Jack's Saloon & Steakhouse, addressed Council. She thanked the City for their due diligence in finding some way to reduce utilities. As a major gas consumer, anything helps. Mayor Baca Gonzalez said they hope to do even better after the first of the year. She called for further public comment.

Second reading of an ordinance regarding the provision of natural gas service by the Trinidad Municipal Natural Gas Department, and decreasing the gas supply charge applicable to all customer service classifications. The ordinance title was read aloud. A motion to approve the provisional ordinance on second reading was made by Councilmember Mattie. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Shew and carried by a unanimous roll call vote.

ORDINANCE NO. 1931

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TRINIDAD, COLORADO, REGARDING THE PROVISION OF NATURAL GAS SERVICE BY THE TRINIDAD MUNICIPAL NATURAL GAS DEPARTMENT, AND DECREASING THE GAS SUPPLY CHARGE APPLICABLE TO ALL CUSTOMER SERVICE CLASSIFICATIONS

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS. Hotel and restaurant liquor license renewal request by King Colorado Enterprises, Inc. d/b/a Black Jack's Saloon & Steakhouse at 225 W. Main Street. Cheryl Clark addressed Council and commented that Black Jack's Saloon & Steakhouse has always been pretty tight with their liquor license, have had no issues and do as asked. She concluded that they appreciate Council's consideration. A motion to renew the hotel and restaurant liquor license was made by Councilmember Bolton and seconded by Councilmember Miles. Councilmember Miles asked the status of the emergency lights, junction box and fire extinguishers noted in the inspection report. Ms. Clark answered that the lights and junction box have been fixed and the extinguishers certified. Roll call was taken on the motion and carried unanimously.

Tavern liquor license renewal request by Ole's Tavern, Inc. d/b/a Ole's Tavern at 2833 Toupal Drive. Mayor Baca Gonzalez asked if a representative was present. Eric East presented himself to Council. A motion to approve the license renewal was made by Councilmember Bolton. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Shew and carried by a unanimous roll call vote of Council members present.

Appointment to the Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee. A motion to appoint Diane Beach to the Committee was made by Councilmember Shew and seconded by Councilmember Velasquez. Planning Director Fineberg announced that there are a few more vacancies on the Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee and urged anyone interested to put their name in. Roll call was taken on the motion and carried unanimously.

Appointment to the Planning, Zoning and Variance Commission. Mayor Baca Gonzalez reminded that Bill Winter is seeking reappointment. A motion to reappoint Mr. Winter was made by Councilmember Mattie and seconded by Councilmember Bolton. The motion carried unanimously upon roll call vote. Councilmember Shew extended appreciation to Mr. Winter for his work on the handicap ramp access on the walkway in front of the Opera House building.

Appointment to the Arkansas River Power Authority to fill the unexpired term of Mayor Baca Gonzalez. Mayor Baca Gonzalez announced that Councilmember Michelle Miles has volunteered to assume the duties of board member of the ARPA board and she has considerable expertise and is confident that her presence on that board will serve the best interests of Trinidad. Councilmember Miles will join Councilmember Shew and she said she is confident they will do the very best job possible in representing the interests of our City. Councilmember Miles commented that she has been to one ARPA meeting and ARPA President Rick Rigel has reached out to her for a board orientation. She added that Councilmember Shew has shared great information with her and they will work together well. Councilmember Shew said he was happy to have her aboard. A motion to appoint Councilmember Michelle Miles to the Arkansas River Power Authority to fill the unexpired term of Mayor Baca Gonzalez was made by Councilmember Bonato and the motion was seconded by Councilmember Bolton. Upon roll call vote, the motion carried unanimously, excepting Councilmember Miles who abstained.

Authorize Mayor Baca Gonzalez's execution of a letter of support for a grant application to the Environmental Protection Agency to fund the remediation of asbestos in multiple downtown buildings. Planning Director Fineberg advised that the intent is to apply for funding to the EPA. At this point depending on how far down the road we are, the grant will either be for Phase 1 or Phase 2 money to do the analysis if that is out of the way by that time. On one or more buildings the City could apply for remediation funding. However at this point it looks like the City will be applying for Phase 1 or Phase 2 analysis. A motion to authorize the execution of the letter of support by the Mayor as requested was made by Councilmember Bolton. Councilmember Shew seconded the motion. Roll call was taken on the motion and carried unanimously.

Resolution scheduling a hearing date on the renewal application filed by Mantelli Partnership d/b/a Mantelli's at 137 W. Main Street. Interim City Attorney Downs advised Council that his understanding is that this matter would be scheduled for the December 29th regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. Robert Land of Newnam, Land, LLP, is willing to serve as prosecutor, however Mr. Land has informed him that the 29th is not a good night for him as he will be out of town for the holidays. He said if acceptable to Council Mr. Land would like to set the hearing for the second or third week in January instead. Interim City Attorney Downs added that his understanding is that the liquor license is scheduled to lapse on December 25th, however, it continues on in a de facto way until action is taken on the license. Mayor Baca Gonzalez confirmed with Interim City Attorney Downs that there would be no negative concerns in postponing the hearing to accommodate Mr. Land's schedule. Interim City Attorney Downs added that presumption of innocence goes to the business owner and they are allowed to continue their business while this is pending. Councilmember Bolton corrected that the date in the resolution is December 18th. Interim City Attorney Downs reiterated the need to postpone the hearing until January at Mr. Land's request. He said he would get the letter agreement to Council for this purpose in their agenda packet. Councilmember Bolton made a motion to table the resolution. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Shew, and carried unanimously upon roll call vote.

BILLS. A motion to approve payment of the bills as presented was made by Councilmember Bolton. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Mattie. Roll call was taken on the motion to approve the bills and it carried unanimously.

PAYROLL, October 13, 2012 through October 26, 2012. A motion to approve the payroll was made by Councilmember Mattie and seconded by Councilmember Shew. The motion carried unanimously.

EXECUTIVE SESSION. For the purpose of determining positions relative to matters that may be subject to negotiations, developing strategy for negotiations, and/or instructing negotiators under C.R.S. Section 24-6-402(4)(e) – Union Negotiations; and, for discussion of a personnel matter under C.R.S. Section 24-6-402(2)(f) and not involving: any specific employees who have requested discussion of the matter in open session; any member of this body or any elected official; the appointment of any person to fill an office of this body or of an elected official; or personnel policies that do not require the discussion of matters personal to particular employees - City Manager applicant consideration. A motion to enter into executive session for the purpose of determining positions relative to matters that may be subject to negotiations, developing strategy for negotiations, and/or instructing negotiators under C.R.S. Section 24-6-402(4)(e) – Union Negotiations – was made by Councilmember Bolton and seconded by Councilmember Bonato. The motion carried unanimously and ensued at 8:06 p.m. The executive session was electronically recorded as required by the Open Meetings Law of Colorado. Upon conclusion of executive session at 9:29 p.m. a motion to return to open session was made by Councilmember Shew and seconded by Councilmember Bolton. The motion carried unanimously upon roll call vote.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS. Selection of Trinidad City Manager. No action was taken on this item.
